## Poet on the High Street

Running alongside our stretched festival, we have established an innovative community heritage poet-in-residence programme for Winchester. With funds from the National Lottery Heritage Fund, Winchester BID, Winchester City Council, and many individuals through a successful crowdfunding campaign, our Poet on the High Street, Jon Seagrave AKA Jonny Fluffypunk, has been engaging people throughout Winchester in exploring the hidden heritage of the city through poetry. ### Poetry Marketplace

Throughout the festival weekend the café area of the Winchester Discovery Centre will be a Poetry Marketplace with poetry activities, bookstalls and more.

## Clare Pollard and Paul Muldoon

The festive opening night for the live Winchester Poetry Festival features Clare Pollard and Paul Muldoon. Two brilliant, vital and inventive poets whose work shares a spirited restlessness and formal intricacy. A rousing return to live poetry readings.

Paul Muldoon was born in County Armagh and now lives in New York. A former radio and television producer for the BBC in Belfast, he has taught at Princeton University for more than thirty years. He is the author of thirteen collections of poetry including *Moy Sand* and *Gravel*, for which he won the 2003 Pulitzer Prize, and *Frolic and Detour*, published in 2019.

Clare Pollard has published five collections of poetry with *Bloodaxe*, most recently ***Incarnation***, and a pamphlet ***The Lives of the Female Poets***, published by Bad Betty Press. She is the current editor of *Modern Poetry in Translation* and poetry editor for *The Idler*.

## **Things Being Various – Paul Muldoon with Jon Sayers**


